| 20 | THE COURT: I understand. If you don't have |
| 21 | your driver's license, that's perfectly okay. |
| 22 | Oftentimes these can be short circuited by just getting |
| 23 | a driver's license, but if you don't have one, you pled |
| 24 | not guilty. Are you raising your hand for something? |
| 25 | MR. EIB: I am. May I grab a chair? It would |

be easier for me to write.

THE COURT: Oh, you having a medical problem 1 2 that you can't stand like everyone else? MR. EIB: I do have a back problem. 3 THE COURT: All right, sir. Grab a chair. 4 5 Right behind you just pull it up from the table and have 6 a seat if you like. 7 MR. EIB: Can I get one of the wheel ones? 8 THE COURT: No, sir. Pull that up if you like. 9 MR. EIB: Thank you. 10 All right. And Officer Moore? THE COURT: 11 OFFICER MOORE: Good afternoon, Your Honor. 12 THE COURT: You may proceed. Thank you. 13 DIRECT TESTIMONY 14 OFFICER MOORE: My name is James Moore. I'm a 15 police officer with the City of Irvine. I've been so 16 for approximately five years. 17 On 6/14/2013, at approximately 1751 hours in 18 the afternoon, I was working uniform patrol in a marked 19 Irvine police unit. I was in the city of Irvine, the 20 county of Orange. 21 THE COURT: Thank you. OFFICER MOORE: I was driving westbound on 22 23 Irvine Center Drive, had stopped at a red signal at 24 Jeffrey, we were in heavy traffic. My attention was 2.5 drawn to the vehicle in front of me. It was an older

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Mercedes.

It was dirty. It had a lot of personal

property strewn about. And what stood out to me was it had a California exempt plate on the back.

Additionally, I noticed that the driver was throwing sunflower seed shells out the driver's side window.

I ran the plate through DMV and it came back record not on file. So I initiated an investigative stop, and I contacted the driver to my right who yielded immediately.

THE COURT: All right. You've indicated to the person on your right. Is that who was present in the vehicle that day?

OFFICER MOORE: That's correct. He was driving the vehicle.

THE COURT: All right. Thank you.

OFFICER MOORE: I asked him for his -- I explained the reason for the stop and I asked him for his license, registration, and insurance. He didn't have any insurance, but he did provide what appeared to be a valid registration card --

THE COURT: All right.

OFFICER MOORE: -- for the exempt plate.

He did not have a driver's license. He gave me a -- what appeared to be a homemade identification card that had been notarized and it had his picture on it.

THE COURT: All right.

OFFICER MOORE: So I took that back to my car, and I conducted a records check on it, based on the information that he had given me, and I was able to identify him in the DMV database, and he did not have a current California driver's license.

THE COURT: All right.

OFFICER MOORE: I rechecked the plate with DMV because maybe it was -- the system was down or something, and it still came back record not on file.

The DMV was closed at that time, so I couldn't call in to further investigate the plate.

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I issued him a written warning on the littering, and I cited him for driving without a license. He was released on the written promise to appear, and he was told to park the vehicle for a licensed driver to come take the vehicle from the shopping center.

THE COURT: And you entered a correctable violation?

OFFICER MOORE: I did not, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Well, it shows on the citation as -- on my copy it shows as a correctable, but in any event.

OFFICER MOORE: Mine says no.

THE COURT: Okay. All right. Anything else, sir? If not, you may cross-examine, Mr. Eib.

MR. EIB: I'd like to -- the officer just testified that he found a match -- I also have a declaration of Mr. Moore here that states that he found a match for Corey Eib. I'd like the officer to explain what the nature of the person or individual that you found a match for is.

> THE COURT: Do you understand that question? OFFICER MOORE: I do not, Your Honor.

THE COURT: All right. Any other question?

BY MR. EIB:

Q So you don't know the nature of the person that you found? The nature of the person in the DMV database?

THE COURT: The officer testified he doesn't understand the question, nor do I. What the nature of a person is. A person is a person and that's it. He ran your name in the database and it came back that there was a suspended license, or expired license -- what was it? Expired or suspended?

OFFICER MOORE: I don't recall.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. EIB: I have a letter from the DMV. It shows the license account. This is February 16th, 2010.

THE COURT: You're marking -- I'll mark that as Defense Exhibit A.

(Defendant's Exhibit A marked for identification)

THE COURT: And you're giving this to me for what purpose? That you're requesting --

MR. EIB: My driver's license --

THE COURT: -- to cancel your driver's license?

MR. EIB: My driver's license account was -- and the card has been destroyed.

THE COURT: All right.

MR. EIB: The reason for that is, there is a political pledge involved in obtaining a driver's

license, and that's against my religious beliefs. 1 cannot identify myself as the person on the application 2 3 for a driver's license. 4 That is a government property. I've gone 5 through a rather protracted event with the Department of 6 State, the United States Department of State, because of 7 the same type of thing with getting a passport. 8 And in my case, I am a bearer of a passport, 9 but because of my political status and religious 10 beliefs, I had to use U.S. citizenship of the state of 11 California in order to obtain a passport. 12 The citation -- do you -- can the Court --13 THE COURT: Do you have any more questions of 14 the officer? If not, then --15 MR. EIB: Yes, I do. 16 THE COURT: -- I'm going to have him sit down. 17 All right. 18 MR. EIB: I do. 19 THE COURT: Finish your questions and then I'll 20 hear from you. 21 BY MR. EIB: It is relevant, Your Honor, if the chief of police is -- if there's an issue with that,

If there is 1 an issue with the officer acting outside of the scope of 2 the authority of the chief of police, then that would 3 have relevance on this case. 4 THE COURT: So you think that when a police 5 officer asks you for a license, California driver's 6 7 license, that he's acting in excess of his authority? Is that what your position is? 8 9 MR. ETB: No. THE COURT: Okay. All right. Then ask a 10 question that's relevant, please. 11 MR. EIB: Well, it's relevant because the chief 12 13 of police did not have his oath of office on file at the 14 county recorder, as is required. He also did not have 15 it on file --16 THE COURT: I don't -- he doesn't know that. 17 MR. EIB: -- with the Secretary of State. 18 THE COURT: I don't know that. And you don't 19 know that, so let's ask him --2.0 MR. EIB: I --

THE COURT: -- a question that he know -- how is he supposed to know if the police chief has his oath of office on file? Ask him a question that he can answer. I'll let you make whatever record you want, believe me.

MR. EIB: Okay.

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THE COURT: Go ahead. 1 BY MR. EIB: 2 Q The person charged that you found in the DM --3 4 you say it's attached to the DMV? You took the ID that 5 I just showed you and you ran that through the 6 Department of Motor Vehicle's information database, 7 correct? A That's correct. 8 9 Q And the person that you came back with, you 10 were unable to -- is it your testimony you're unable to 11 testify as to the nature of that person or individual? 12 THE COURT: I don't understand that -- whatever 13 that means, sir. | 25 | The person identified also on that certificate |
| 26 | of live birth, which is the person on the application |

for the driver's license, is an illegitimate child as identified by the mother's maiden name, and the father's last name being different.

My mother and father were joined in holy matrimony and my -- I'm not in the State of California, which is a political state. Its borders are defined by the constitution of California 1849. The 1879 constitution does not -- originally attempted to define the borders of the State, and that was overturned and had to be changed. It operates within California 1849.

Texas vs. White, states that the California 1849 to persist as a legal jurisdiction, and is assumed to have citizens. And there is no requirement in that jurisdiction for a driver's license.

In order to get a driver's license you'd have to agree to foreign jurisdiction of the United States. Commercial Code 9307(h), identifies that location of the United States as being in Washington, D.C. I have no obligation to a foreign jurisdiction.

And -- nor did I ever identify myself as the person charged, with a first, middle, last name. My given and surname are spelled identically for the Defendant charged, the Defendant's first and last name, but mine is a given and surname.

It's identified on both the document for -- which I presented to the officer, and it's also

identified on a passport as a given and surname, not first, middle, and last. The first, middle, and last is the person who is identified by the birth certificate. I have no obligation to identify myself as that person. Any obligation that existed prior to me understanding the true nature of U.S. citizenship and the political obligations to that have all been

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corrected.

The -- now the officer indicated that this was homemade identification. It does carry, which I'll -- I have the original. This is a copy. I have the original, which has been used to travel across the border from a foreign country back into this country. And I'll place this here so you can see that.

THE COURT: All right. We'll mark that for identification. You want us to receive that as evidence then?

MR. EIB: Yes, please.

THE COURT: All right. Ben, why don't you take that document and we'll mark that --
