2 AFTERNOON SESSION

3 (PROCEEDINGS IN OPEN COURT)

4 (Call to order at 3:56 p.m.)

5 THE COURT: Corey Eib. Officer Moore -- Mr.  
6 Moore, step forward, please. And good afternoon, Mr.  
7 Eib, this is Case IRM541842, and this is a -- hold on  
8 just a moment, sir. Let me just call the case.

9 You're charged with driving without a valid  
10 California driver's license. It's marked as  
11 correctable, so if you have a valid driver's license, I  
12 can dismiss this charge.

13 MR. EIB: Well, due to nature of the  
14 application for the driver's license.

15 THE COURT: Yeah.

16 MR. EIB: The nature of U.S. citizenship and my  
17 religious beliefs and political beliefs, I can't --

18 THE COURT: Oh, that's okay --

19 MR. EIB: -- sign that.

20 THE COURT: I understand. If you don't have  
21 your driver's license, that's perfectly okay.  
22 Oftentimes these can be short circuited by just getting  
23 a driver's license, but if you don't have one, you pled  
24 not guilty. Are you raising your hand for something?

25 MR. EIB: I am. May I grab a chair? It would  
26 be easier for me to write.

1 THE COURT: Oh, you having a medical problem  
2 that you can't stand like everyone else?

3 MR. EIB: I do have a back problem.

4 THE COURT: All right, sir. Grab a chair.  
5 Right behind you just pull it up from the table and have  
6 a seat if you like.

7 MR. EIB: Can I get one of the wheel ones?

8 THE COURT: No, sir. Pull that up if you like.

9 MR. EIB: Thank you.

10 THE COURT: All right. And Officer Moore?

11 OFFICER MOORE: Good afternoon, Your Honor.

12 THE COURT: You may proceed. Thank you.

13 DIRECT TESTIMONY

14 OFFICER MOORE: My name is James Moore. I'm a  
15 police officer with the City of Irvine. I've been so  
16 for approximately five years.

17 On 6/14/2013, at approximately 1751 hours in  
18 the afternoon, I was working uniform patrol in a marked  
19 Irvine police unit. I was in the city of Irvine, the  
20 county of Orange.

21 THE COURT: Thank you.

22 OFFICER MOORE: I was driving westbound on  
23 Irvine Center Drive, had stopped at a red signal at  
24 Jeffrey, we were in heavy traffic. My attention was  
25 drawn to the vehicle in front of me. It was an older  
26 Mercedes. It was dirty. It had a lot of personal

1 property strewn about. And what stood out to me was it  
2 had a California exempt plate on the back.

3           Additionally, I noticed that the driver was  
4 throwing sunflower seed shells out the driver's side  
5 window.

6           I ran the plate through DMV and it came back  
7 record not on file. So I initiated an investigative  
8 stop, and I contacted the driver to my right who yielded  
9 immediately.

10           THE COURT: All right. You've indicated to the  
11 person on your right. Is that who was present in the  
12 vehicle that day?

13           OFFICER MOORE: That's correct. He was driving  
14 the vehicle.

15           THE COURT: All right. Thank you.

16           OFFICER MOORE: I asked him for his -- I  
17 explained the reason for the stop and I asked him for  
18 his license, registration, and insurance. He didn't  
19 have any insurance, but he did provide what appeared to  
20 be a valid registration card --

21           THE COURT: All right.

22           OFFICER MOORE: -- for the exempt plate.

23           He did not have a driver's license. He gave me  
24 a -- what appeared to be a homemade identification card  
25 that had been notarized and it had his picture on it.

26           THE COURT: All right.

1           OFFICER MOORE: So I took that back to my car,  
2 and I conducted a records check on it, based on the  
3 information that he had given me, and I was able to  
4 identify him in the DMV database, and he did not have a  
5 current California driver's license.

6           THE COURT: All right.

7           OFFICER MOORE: I rechecked the plate with DMV  
8 because maybe it was -- the system was down or  
9 something, and it still came back record not on file.  
10 The DMV was closed at that time, so I couldn't call in  
11 to further investigate the plate.

12           I issued him a written warning on the  
13 littering, and I cited him for driving without a  
14 license. He was released on the written promise to  
15 appear, and he was told to park the vehicle for a  
16 licensed driver to come take the vehicle from the  
17 shopping center.

18           THE COURT: And you entered a correctable  
19 violation?

20           OFFICER MOORE: I did not, Your Honor.

21           THE COURT: Well, it shows on the citation  
22 as -- on my copy it shows as a correctable, but in any  
23 event.

24           OFFICER MOORE: Mine says no.

25           THE COURT: Okay. All right. Anything else,  
26 sir? If not, you may cross-examine, Mr. Eib.

1 MR. EIB: Sure. First, I have a question for  
2 yourself, Mr. Commissioner. Are you operating on your  
3 oath today?

4 THE COURT: You may cross-examine the officer.  
5 I'm not on the witness stand.

6 Cross-examine the officer if you wish, or if  
7 you don't wish, then we'll proceed.

8 MR. EIB: I'd like the record to reflect that  
9 you refused to answer that question.

10 CROSS-EXAMINATION

11 BY MR. EIB:

12 Q Were you operating on your oath the day that  
13 you stopped me?

14 A I don't know what that means.

15 Q In your oath of office?

16 A Yes.

17 Q You were operating on your oath?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And your authority to arrest, does that come  
20 from the chief of police?

21 A It comes from the California Penal Code.

22 Q Could you identify what portion of the Penal  
23 Code that that come from?

24 A It --

25 THE COURT: Sir, you were not arrested.

26 MR. EIB: When somebody is cited, the vehicle



1 code clearly states that the arrestee, it refers to the  
2 arrestee who's been cited.

3 THE COURT: The officer answered your question.

4 MR. EIB: Okay.

5 BY MR. EIB:

6 Q And part of that oath to uphold the  
7 constitution, does that include the First Amendment, the  
8 right to free speech?

9 A It would.

10 Q Okay. And I have a copy of the actual  
11 identification. This is a copy of the identification  
12 that was shown.

13 THE COURT: Mr. Eib, you're not charged with  
14 failing to have identification. You're charged with  
15 failing to have a valid California driver's license,  
16 which gives you the privilege to drive in the state of  
17 California.

18 MR. EIB: I'd like to -- the officer just  
19 testified that he found a match -- I also have a  
20 declaration of Mr. Moore here that states that he found  
21 a match for Corey Eib. I'd like the officer to explain  
22 what the nature of the person or individual that you  
23 found a match for is.

24 THE COURT: Do you understand that question?

25 OFFICER MOORE: I do not, Your Honor.

26 THE COURT: All right. Any other question?

1 BY MR. EIB:

2 Q So you don't know the nature of the person that  
3 you found? The nature of the person in the DMV  
4 database?

5 THE COURT: The officer testified he doesn't  
6 understand the question, nor do I. What the nature of a  
7 person is. A person is a person and that's it. He ran  
8 your name in the database and it came back that there  
9 was a suspended license, or expired license -- what was  
10 it? Expired or suspended?

11 OFFICER MOORE: I don't recall.

12 THE COURT: Okay.

13 MR. EIB: I have a letter from the DMV. It  
14 shows the license account. This is February 16th, 2010.

15 THE COURT: You're marking -- I'll mark that as  
16 Defense Exhibit A.

17 (Defendant's Exhibit A marked for identification)

18 THE COURT: And you're giving this to me for  
19 what purpose? That you're requesting --

20 MR. EIB: My driver's license --

21 THE COURT: -- to cancel your driver's license?

22 MR. EIB: My driver's license account was --  
23 and the card has been destroyed.

24 THE COURT: All right.

25 MR. EIB: The reason for that is, there is a  
26 political pledge involved in obtaining a driver's

1 license, and that's against my religious beliefs. I  
2 cannot identify myself as the person on the application  
3 for a driver's license.

4 That is a government property. I've gone  
5 through a rather protracted event with the Department of  
6 State, the United States Department of State, because of  
7 the same type of thing with getting a passport.

8 And in my case, I am a bearer of a passport,  
9 but because of my political status and religious  
10 beliefs, I had to use U.S. citizenship of the state of  
11 California in order to obtain a passport.

12 The citation -- do you -- can the Court --

13 THE COURT: Do you have any more questions of  
14 the officer? If not, then --

15 MR. EIB: Yes, I do.

16 THE COURT: -- I'm going to have him sit down.  
17 All right.

18 MR. EIB: I do.

19 THE COURT: Finish your questions and then I'll  
20 hear from you.

21 BY MR. EIB:

22 Q When you first submitted the citation to the  
23 Court, was it rejected?

24 A I don't -- I don't believe so.

25 Q Did you modify the citation --

26 A I did.

1 Q -- and resubmit it to the Court?

2 A I added your birthday and your age.

3 Q Would you please state the date of birth that  
4 you put on the modification?

5 A 6/21/69.

6 Q And the age that you put on that modification?

7 A It's cut off on my copy.

8 Q Okay. Do the rules require that the ticket  
9 have the Defendant's signature on the citation for the  
10 citation to be valid?

11 THE COURT: Whose rules?

12 MR. EIB: The rules from the judicial council  
13 of California for forms and citations.

14 THE COURT: The only reason for a signature,  
15 sir, is for a written promise to appear. You're here.  
16 So whether or not a citation is required to be signed or  
17 not is moot. You're here. You've made your appearance  
18 in Court and --

19 MR. EIB: Sir, I want the --

20 THE COURT: -- that's irrelevant.

21 MR. EIB: -- Court to recognize that if I've  
22 identified myself as a U.S. citizen I'm obligated to  
23 correct that mistake. Has that happened?

24 THE COURT: I'm sorry?

25 MR. EIB: Have I identified myself as a U.S.  
26 citizen in these proceedings?

1 THE COURT: I didn't ask you that question.

2 MR. EIB: Well, I'm asking because you said  
3 I've appeared and the appearance --

4 THE COURT: Appeared means your person is  
5 present, and you answered to Corey Brandon Eib, both --  
6 well, this afternoon as well as this morning on other  
7 cases.

8 MR. EIB: The --

9 THE COURT: So I recognize you. Go ahead.

10 MR. EIB: Do you recognize me as the -- as  
11 government property or --

12 THE COURT: Property?

13 MR. EIB: Yes.

14 THE COURT: No, you're a person.

15 MR. EIB: And what is the nature of the person  
16 that's charged?

17 THE COURT: Sir, do you have a -- if you don't  
18 have a valid driver's license you're in violation of the  
19 California state law. If you do, you won't be.  
20 Anything else you want to say?

21 MR. EIB: Oh, yeah.

22 THE COURT: Any more questions for Officer  
23 Moore?

24 MR. EIB: I do.

25 THE COURT: All right. Let's get on with it.

26 ///

1 BY MR. EIB:

2 Q Officer Moore, when you --

3 May I have just a moment to review this?

4 THE COURT: Certainly.

5 (Pause)

6 BY MR. EIB:

7 Q You said, you stated you issued a warning for  
8 littering?

9 A Correct.

10 Q Is that correct? On the citation, you wrote  
11 littering in the charging area, but didn't include any  
12 type of the penal, or the code, that was violated. Was  
13 the -- is a warning -- when you issue a written warning,  
14 is that done on a citation for a notice to appear?

15 THE COURT: That's an irrelevant question,  
16 quite honestly. He's not charging you with that. So  
17 I'm not going to --

18 MR. EIB: But it's on the citation.

19 THE COURT: I don't know that. The citation is  
20 not in evidence. Go ahead.

21 MR. EIB: This citation is not in evidence.

22 THE COURT: Ask questions -- you may ask a  
23 question that's relevant to these proceedings. Go  
24 ahead.

25 BY MR. EIB:

26 Q The -- you stated that you were operating on

1 your oath and you are acting under the authority of the  
2 chief of police?

3 A You stated that, I did not.

4 Q Are you acting -- when you are an Irvine  
5 officer, do you act on the authority of the Irvine chief  
6 of police?

7 A He's the person that hired me.

8 Q Okay.

9 A Is that what you're asking? I don't fully  
10 understand the question.

11 Q When you conduct operations for law  
12 enforcement, or as a -- any type of officer for the City  
13 of Irvine, are you acting under the authority of the  
14 chief of police or some other form of authority?

15 THE COURT: I don't understand your question,  
16 sir. He's a sworn officer in the state of California.  
17 So what specifically are you ask -- do you not  
18 understand what a police officer is?

19 MR. EIB: I do understand --

20 THE COURT: Okay.

21 MR. EIB: -- very well what a police officer  
22 is.

23 THE COURT: Then ask a question that's relevant  
24 to these proceedings.

25 MR. EIB: It is relevant, Your Honor, if the  
26 chief of police is -- if there's an issue with that,

1 then that would have bearing on this case. If there is  
2 an issue with the officer acting outside of the scope of  
3 the authority of the chief of police, then that would  
4 have relevance on this case.

5 THE COURT: So you think that when a police  
6 officer asks you for a license, California driver's  
7 license, that he's acting in excess of his authority?  
8 Is that what your position is?

9 MR. EIB: No.

10 THE COURT: Okay. All right. Then ask a  
11 question that's relevant, please.

12 MR. EIB: Well, it's relevant because the chief  
13 of police did not have his oath of office on file at the  
14 county recorder, as is required. He also did not have  
15 it on file --

16 THE COURT: I don't -- he doesn't know that.

17 MR. EIB: -- with the Secretary of State.

18 THE COURT: I don't know that. And you don't  
19 know that, so let's ask him --

20 MR. EIB: I --

21 THE COURT: -- a question that he know -- how  
22 is he supposed to know if the police chief has his oath  
23 of office on file? Ask him a question that he can  
24 answer. I'll let you make whatever record you want,  
25 believe me.

26 MR. EIB: Okay.



1 THE COURT: Go ahead.

2 BY MR. EIB:

3 Q The person charged that you found in the DM --  
4 you say it's attached to the DMV? You took the ID that  
5 I just showed you and you ran that through the  
6 Department of Motor Vehicle's information database,  
7 correct?

8 A That's correct.

9 Q And the person that you came back with, you  
10 were unable to -- is it your testimony you're unable to  
11 testify as to the nature of that person or individual?

12 THE COURT: I don't understand that -- whatever  
13 that means, sir. So I'm not going to --

14 MR. EIB: The person --

15 THE COURT: I'm going to tell him not to answer  
16 unless he understands what the nature of a person is.

17 OFFICER MOORE: Your Honor, I do not.

18 THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead. Ask a question  
19 that he can answer, or that I will order him to answer  
20 if I believe it's a relevant question. What a nature of  
21 a person is, sir, is not something --

22 MR. EIB: The nature --

23 THE COURT: -- that we deal with here. It's --  
24 maybe you deal with in a philosophy class in college.  
25 But here -- we're talking about an individual who is  
26 driving a car, the officer sees that individual driving

1 a car. He says it's you. He asks you for a license.  
2 You don't have a license. We checked the DMV. There is  
3 no license.

4 Anything else you want to ask that's relevant  
5 to these proceedings?

6 MR. EIB: The --

7 BY MR. EIB:

8 Q The laws that you were enforcing, those are the  
9 administrative division of the State of -- of the United  
10 States, the --

11 THE COURT: Ask a question. If you have a  
12 question, ask it. If you want to make a statement I  
13 will allow you to make a statement.

14 MR. EIB: Okay.

15 THE COURT: But you can't mix them together.

16 MR. EIB: I think I'm conclu -- done with my  
17 questions.

18 THE COURT: All right. Thank you. Officer, if  
19 you'd like to have a seat, you may.

20 OFFICER MOORE: I'm okay. Thank you.

21 THE COURT: All right. Go ahead. Did you wish  
22 to testify, sir?

23 MR. EIB: I do.

24 THE COURT: All right. Go ahead.

25 DIRECT TESTIMONY

26 MR. EIB: Your Honor, I have a letter from the

1 DMV, which supports that the laws, which were enforced,  
2 are a foreign jurisdiction to California 1849, the state  
3 that entered the Union in 1850. The letter states that  
4 the DMV uses the term United States for purposes of  
5 choice of law purposes. It also defines the location of  
6 the United States as being in Washington, D.C.

7 I don't consent to a foreign jurisdiction. The  
8 DMV has acknowledge --

9 THE COURT: Would you like me to enter that  
10 into evidence?

11 MR. EIB: Yes, please.

12 THE COURT: All right. It's not authenticated.  
13 It's hearsay. It's not going to be entered into  
14 evidence. Okay?

15 Go ahead. Anything else you want to say? I  
16 just want to make sure that you're able to make your  
17 record, but if you have certified copies of DMV  
18 statements, which you did subpoena, and are here in the  
19 Court, we provided you copies of them and all of them do  
20 indicate that you had a license at one time and you  
21 don't have one anymore.

22 So --

23 MR. EIB: That's correct.

24 THE COURT: All right.

25 MR. EIB: Yeah, and the license account has  
26 been closed.

1 THE COURT: Okay. The account's closed.

2 MR. EIB: And the Anti-Peonage Act --

3 THE COURT: So we all -- the Anti who?

4 MR. EIB: Peonage.

5 THE COURT: Spell it.

6 MR. EIB: P-E-O-N-A-G-E.

7 THE COURT: I don't understand that. I may be  
8 ignorant, but you want to explain that to me?

9 MR. EIB: Well, it means that you cannot be  
10 held to involuntary servitude within the country.

11 THE COURT: Okay. I'm for that.

12 MR. EIB: Pardon me?

13 THE COURT: I'm much in favor of not being held  
14 to involuntary servitude.

15 MR. EIB: Absolutely.

16 THE COURT: Go ahead.

17 MR. EIB: The person charged is identified by  
18 the certificate of live birth, which is property of the  
19 State of California, confirm that with -- that's easily  
20 confirmed -- it's common knowledge. In order to get a  
21 certified copy of that you would go to a government  
22 office. At no time do I -- am I permitted from my  
23 personal, political, and religious beliefs, to identify  
24 myself as property of the government.

25 The person identified also on that certificate  
26 of live birth, which is the person on the application

1 for the driver's license, is an illegitimate child as  
2 identified by the mother's maiden name, and the father's  
3 last name being different.

4 My mother and father were joined in holy  
5 matrimony and my -- I'm not in the State of California,  
6 which is a political state. Its borders are defined by  
7 the constitution of California 1849. The 1879  
8 constitution does not -- originally attempted to define  
9 the borders of the State, and that was overturned and  
10 had to be changed. It operates within California 1849.

11 *Texas vs. White*, states that the California  
12 1849 to persist as a legal jurisdiction, and is assumed  
13 to have citizens. And there is no requirement in that  
14 jurisdiction for a driver's license.

15 In order to get a driver's license you'd have  
16 to agree to foreign jurisdiction of the United States.  
17 Commercial Code 9307(h), identifies that location of the  
18 United States as being in Washington, D.C. I have no  
19 obligation to a foreign jurisdiction.

20 And -- nor did I ever identify myself as the  
21 person charged, with a first, middle, last name. My  
22 given and surname are spelled identically for the  
23 Defendant charged, the Defendant's first and last name,  
24 but mine is a given and surname.

25 It's identified on both the document for --  
26 which I presented to the officer, and it's also

1 identified on a passport as a given and surname, not  
2 first, middle, and last. The first, middle, and last is  
3 the person who is identified by the birth certificate.

4 I have no obligation to identify myself as that  
5 person. Any obligation that existed prior to me  
6 understanding the true nature of U.S. citizenship and  
7 the political obligations to that have all been  
8 corrected.

9 The -- now the officer indicated that this was  
10 homemade identification. It does carry, which I'll -- I  
11 have the original. This is a copy. I have the  
12 original, which has been used to travel across the  
13 border from a foreign country back into this country.  
14 And I'll place this here so you can see that.

15 THE COURT: All right. We'll mark that for  
16 identification. You want us to receive that as evidence  
17 then?

18 MR. EIB: Yes, please.

19 THE COURT: All right. Ben, why don't you take  
20 that document and we'll mark that --

21 MR. EIB: Well, this --

22 THE COURT: -- as -- I thought you wanted to  
23 have that received. You don't want us to receive that?

24 MR. EIB: As long as I'll get it back.

25 THE COURT: Well, you're entering something  
26 into evidence. You can have a copy back. We'll take

1 the original as evidence.

2 MR. EIB: No, I won't --

3 THE COURT: Okay.

4 MR. EIB: -- I won't do the original.

5 THE COURT: Okay. All right.

6 MR. EIB: I'll give you a copy of it.

7 THE COURT: All right. What's -- and what's  
8 next? Anything else you want to say?

9 MR. EIB: Yes.

10 THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead. Okay, so that's  
11 okay.

12 MR. EIB: Let me get a copy. Here is a copy.  
13 There is a copy for the Court.

14 THE COURT: The Court's not going to receive a  
15 copy.

16 MR. EIB: It's got a certified copy by document  
17 custodian.

18 THE COURT: I'm finding it's not relevant  
19 because it's not a California driver's license. The  
20 issue in this case is were you, or whoever the driver of  
21 the vehicle was, who has been identified as you, a  
22 California licensed driver at the time.

23 Did you have a driver's license? If you  
24 didn't, I'm going to find you guilty. If you did, show  
25 it.

26 Or if you have a justification why you

1 shouldn't have one --

2 MR. EIB: At this time --

3 THE COURT: -- then issue arguments --

4 MR. EIB: -- I would like to enter this into  
5 Court's -- Felony Information Affidavit. If it would  
6 like to go to the Court's --

7 THE COURT: It needs to be relevant. What is  
8 that?

9 MR. EIB: It is relevant.

10 THE COURT: What is it?

11 MR. EIB: It's the affi -- it's information  
12 affidavit of a felony recently committed by the chief of  
13 police, David Maggard, whose authority that all of this  
14 came on, and I'm held to -- I'm being held as a  
15 political prisoner to identify myself as a person that I  
16 do not wish to identify myself as.

17 THE COURT: I'm finding that not to be  
18 relevant. It's not an authenticated document. And --

19 MR. EIB: It's got my signature on it.

20 THE COURT: -- I'm not going to receive it. It  
21 may have your signature that you filed a complaint  
22 against the --

23 MR. EIB: I have authenticated copies from --

24 THE COURT: Yes.

25 MR. EIB: -- the -- it's from both the  
26 Secretary of State, as well as the Orange County



1 Recorder, and I have a letter from the Irvine Police  
2 Department here, which shows --

3 THE COURT: Which shows what? That Irvine  
4 Police Department does not have the authority to --

5 MR. EIB: No, that the city --

6 THE COURT: -- exercise police control --

7 MR. EIB: -- council never appointed David  
8 Maggard as chief of police.

9 THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. I'll review  
10 that, and I'll let you know if it's relevant or not.  
11 Let me see it.

12 MR. EIB: Yes, sir.

13 THE COURT: All right. Anything other than  
14 that -- go ahead, sir.

15 MR. EIB: There is obligation -- oh, the other  
16 part was the registration.

17 THE COURT: No, the registration you weren't  
18 charged with.

19 MR. EIB: Oh, I know I'm not charged with it.  
20 There is no violation.

21 THE COURT: I just said there's no violation  
22 that you're charged with, so --

23 MR. EIB: But he --

24 THE COURT: -- that would not be relevant.

25 MR. EIB: The officer stated that it was a  
26 motor vehicle on the -- like a vehicle, it's registered

1 as an automobile, not a motor vehicle.

2 THE COURT: Okay. We'll correct our records to  
3 show that it was an automobile not a motor vehicle.

4 MR. EIB: Okay. And I also have a copy, a  
5 certified document, from the Registrar of Voters, shows  
6 that the person charged is an uninhabited political  
7 office.

8 THE COURT: I'm sorry?

9 MR. EIB: It's an uninhabited political office.

10 THE COURT: What is?

11 MR. EIB: The person charged. Corey Brandon  
12 Eib, with that date of birth --

13 THE COURT: Corey Brandon Eib.

14 MR. EIB: -- and that Social Security number.

15 THE COURT: Oh.

16 MR. EIB: And that was recently certified --

17 THE COURT: Well, I can see you.

18 MR. EIB: Yes.

19 THE COURT: And you're not a political office.  
20 You are an individual. You're a person. The officer  
21 cited you as driving the car. You need a driver's  
22 license to --

23 MR. EIB: No, he didn't cite me, Your Honor.

24 THE COURT: -- drive a car.

25 MR. EIB: He cited the person who is on the  
26 application for the driver's license account. That's

1 who he cited. He got that information. He admitted to  
2 already getting that information --

3 THE COURT: You misunderstand. But that's  
4 okay. I think you misunderstand a lot.

5 MR. EIB: Are you saying I must identify myself  
6 as the person on that application?

7 THE COURT: Sir, the officer has the burden of  
8 proof. He has testified that he saw you, the person I'm  
9 looking at here in court, driving a motor vehicle, you,  
10 did not have a valid California driver's license,  
11 therefore, you are guilty of the violation.

12 MR. EIB: He didn't charge me.

13 THE COURT: Thank you, sir.

14 All right. I do find you guilty beyond a  
15 reasonable doubt. It's an infraction. The fine is \$75,  
16 plus penalties and assessments; it comes out to \$402,  
17 and I'll receive your documents as evidence. Thank you,  
18 sir.

19 MR. EIB: That is --

20 THE COURT: You're free to go.

21 MR. EIB: -- felony information complaints,  
22 sir.

23 THE COURT: Thank you. I appreciate that.  
24 I'll put it in the Court's file.

25 OFFICER MOORE: Thank you, Your Honor.

26 THE COURT: Thank you. You can go across the

1 hall and either take care of that today. If you set up  
2 payments, that's certainly acceptable.

3 MR. EIB: Oh, this morning -- a different issue  
4 this morning when I was here, and you said that there  
5 were other cases that needed to be heard at a different  
6 court?

7 THE COURT: Yes, sir.

8 MR. EIB: I went across the way. They said you  
9 have to go to Fullerton. Fullerton's not safe; unless  
10 the Court can guarantee my safety from Fullerton PD,  
11 there is no way I'll be going to Fullerton.

12 THE COURT: That's where the Court is located,  
13 sir. Sorry. If you want to deal with civil assessments  
14 there's only one court in the county that's a dedicated  
15 civil assessment court.

16 MR. EIB: I do --

17 THE COURT: So --

18 MR. EIB: I do believe that this will be going  
19 to a higher court.

20 THE COURT: And you have a right to file your  
21 appeal within 30 days, sir. Thank you.
